State of Georgia } Before me Richard W. Burkhalter an  
Linch County, } acting Justices of the peace in and for said  
County and State aforesaid personally came Malley Burnett  
resident of the state and county aforesaid aged (73) seventy three  
years who after being duly sworn in common form of law  
Deponent and on her oath makes the following declaration in order  
to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by an act of the Congress  
of the United States passed on the fourth day of July Eighteen  
hundred and thirty two granting to certain Widows whose husbands  
served in the war of the Revolution who served in behalf of  
the United States against Great Britain that she was the wife  
of and now the widow of John Burnett who formerly resided in  
North Carolina Onslow County who was a private soldier in the  
revolutionary war and that she was married to her aforesaid  
husband John Burnett in the state of Georgia and County of Burke  
and (deponent) thinks on the twenty fourth day of October 1802  
and he died in the County of Bulloch on the seventh day  
of April 1826 in the state of Georgia that her aforesaid husband  
John Burnett served in the war of the Revolution some seven  
years and served part of his time under Captain David Love of the  
state of North Carolina Onslow County and deponent thinks Colonel  
Mitchell and probably others which she cannot recollect to have  
heard her husband say that in the said John Burnett was in the  
battle of Klosses House and in other engagements against the  
British and Tories which she on her oath cannot recollect to name  
and deponent further says that her aforesaid husband John  
Burnett has often told her that he had a regular discharge from  
said service that he the said John Burnett received shortly after  
to the State of Georgia leaving his discharge with a man by

name of Spicer which was to collect his service money that  
they died shortly after and that her aforesaid husband John Burnett  
never got his discharge. Thereafter from said Spicer nor his money,  
Deponent does not know whether said Spicer was an officer in said  
army or not and that her aforesaid husband never received any pay  
his lifetime as Deponent knows of ~~his lifetime~~ for his revolutionary  
services and that she on her part have never made any application  
for aforesaid pension and she doth hereby relinquish all claims  
and accounts before made for this her pension except the present one.
